On the morning of March 8, 2020, Rose Lee Schwitzer of Manassas passed away at the age of 74.

She was born to the late Mac and Thelma Lee, in Bristol, TN in 1945. Rose graduated from Tennessee High School in 1963 and received a BA in Psychology from East Tennessee State University in 1967.

She married the late Manfred Schwitzer in 1972, and they lived together in Alexandria, VA for sixteen years. Rose eventually moved to Manassas after her husband passed in 1988. Rose is survived by her sister Billie Johnson; her stepson Patrick Schwitzer and wife Dorie; and her stepdaughter Suzanne Pitts and husband Rich. She is also survived by four grandchildren and two great-grandchildren.

Always an avid learner, Rose returned to school to become a Registered Nurse. She began her nursing career at Mt. Vernon Hospital in 1976 and ended her career in 2015 working for a general surgeon specializing in breast cancer. In her spare time, Rose enjoyed being outside working in one of her many gardens, this led her to become a Master Gardener. Dogs also brought her joy and held a special place in her heart. She knew and adored all the dogs in her neighborhood and they adored her right back.
