“ I will miss my Grandma so much. Pop Pop and Grandma lived right down the road from my family. I was truly blessed to have had them so close. I remember friends saying they didn't know their grandparents or weren't very close to them and that seemed beyond strange to me as a kid, now it's sad. I wouldn't trade a single second of my time spent with them and only wish we had so much more time together.

Some of my favorite memories are from 6th grade. When I went to my grandparent's house every morning before school and then rode the bus back each afternoon. In the morning when Mom dropped me off at Grandma's she would have the newspaper on the kitchen table and would already have pulled the Kid's Post from inside and sat it in front of "my seat" between her's and Pop Pop's at the table. Grandma would make me hot cocoa and we would work on crossword puzzles together or sometimes play Solitaire. She always amazed me at how good she was!

Sometimes Grandma would pick me up early from school for Orthodontist appointments. They were often scheduled while my Mom and Dad were working. I LOVED when Grandma took me!! (Sorry Mom haha!) Before my appointment Grandma would give me advil. It hurt getting my braces tightened and Grandma knew by the time I was done the medicine would be working and I wouldn't be in pain. My Grandma was always prepared and thinking of everyone else. After the appointments Grandma would stop for a milkshake, because of course they helped my mouth! Then she'd ask, "Do you want to go back to school?" You can probably guess my answer... and we would go back to her house and I'd have lunch with her and Pop Pop while she helped me with any homework I had.

Grandma was one of the most selfless people I have ever known. She would always listen and remember everything. I could tell her about a person and later she would ask how they were. Or tell her about a project or event and she would ask how it went.

As I got older, Grandma started spending a lot of her time volunteering with Medical Missionaries. I had a part-time job at a grocery store while going to college, it was minutes from the Linton Hall School where Grandma volunteered. She would come in weekly and each time swing by the bakery/deli department where I worked. As I saw her walking up I would run out from behind the counter to hug her and say hello. My co-workers grew to know and greet "Grandma" each time too!

If only the world had more Grandmas like mine... but she was most definitely one-of-a-kind.

Grandma will be more than missed, and by so many. I know one day I will see her and Pop Pop again, until then I know "my seat" between them will be ready at the kitchen table. ❤️
