George Elliott Hill (age 86)

On Thursday, Feb. 25, 2016, George Elliott Hill, beloved husband of Jeannie Brady Hill died from complications of Parkinson's disease. He was 86.

Born in Philadelphia, PA., George grew up in the Washington, D.C., area and Annapolis, Md., and spent summers at his grandparents' home on the ocean in Wildwood, N.J.

He attended Rensselaer Polytechnic Institute in Troy, N.Y., before joining the U.S. Navy. He later served in the Air Force for four years during the Korean War stationed at the former base at Independent Hill in Northern Virginia where he met and married his first wife, Mary Catherine Seeley (deceased). He began working at Manassas Hardware Co. owned by his then father-in-law, Conway Seeley. George later became manager and eventually owner of Manassas Hardware Co., as well as Martin Hardware in Charlottesville, VA. He was an active member of the Manassas Rotary Club for many years, and was honored to be listed in the Millennium Edition of "National Register's Who's Who in Executives and Professionals."

A devoted Redskins fan and avid reader, George also enjoyed playing bridge with friends. After retiring, he traveled extensively with his wife. He was especially fond of vacationing in Aruba, where they spent numerous Christmas holidays.

George is survived by his wife, his brother Warren Hill, his one son, three granddaughters and three great grandchildren.
