



Robert Marvin Snuggs III

November 27, 1944 - December 3, 2024

Robert M. Snuggs, known to most as Bob, passed away peacefully on December 3, 2024 after a long battle with Parkinson's Disease. He was born November 27, 1942, in Montgomery, Alabama to Robert and Eloise Snuggs.

The family moved to Panama City, Florida where Bob graduated from Bay High School and was inducted into the Hall of Fame. He continued his education, receiving his PhD in Physics from Georgia Tech and worked for the Department of the Navy for 38 years followed by 12 years as an employee in the private sector serving the submarine community. Bob was a pioneer in the application of digital technology to submarine combat systems and underwater systems and was instrumental in replacing analog system processing with state of the art technology. Throughout his career his engineering contributions, his leadership in driving systems through the new technology and innovation and his mentoring of engineers and managers profoundly influenced the success of vital combat systems. For his extraordinary value to the success of the United States Navy Submarine Program, he was awarded the Distinguished Civilian Award for Submarine Professional Excellence.

He loved his work and sports, and he had a big brain that was evident when anyone talked to him. He loved his family and enjoyed spending time around them. He fought hard to overcome the challenges and the limits associated

with the disease. His caregivers and Hospice provided him with excellent care that enhanced his life and the family will be forever grateful.

Bob was a member of Emmanuel Baptist Church.

Bob is preceded in death by his son, Robbie, and his parents. He is survived by his wife of forty years, Debbie, his brothers Bill and Andy (Sarabeth) and a host of nieces and nephews.
