August 5, 1971 - January 30, 2016

Sean King Jones passed away on January 30, 2016 at his childhood home. He was 45. He was born in Alexandria, VA on August 5, 1971. He was the best son a mother could have, and a fantastic brother. He was always there for his family whenever they needed anything at all. He graduated from Manassas Park High School in 1989 and Savannah College of Art and Design in 1993. He was a graphic designer, first for the Journal in Fairfax, and later for the Washington Post, where he worked for the past 14 years. Sean was an avid comic book and gaming enthusiast and loved to play cards with his friends and family. He enjoyed driving to Maryland to play cards with his friends at the Historic Savage Mills Mall Family Game store. He adored his nieces and nephews and spent hours playing with Bailey, Trey, Autumn, and Charles. He never missed their birthday parties and loved to send cards to his family on every holiday. Sean was diagnosed with a glioblastoma multiforme brain tumor in August 2014 and underwent his first surgery to remove the tumor on his 44th birthday. Sean was the best patient, never complaining about anything other than no longer being able to drive his new car. Sean loved all the visits, care packages, and food that his family, friends, and coworkers sent over the past 18 months. A memorial service will be held at noon on Saturday, February 13 at the Life Church where Sean was baptized, 11234 Balls Ford Road, Manassas, VA 20109, with lunch to follow. His mom Marti, and his sisters Phoebe and Erin would love to see ya'll there.

“ I first met Sean in January 2003. I'd driven up to Dundalk, Maryland to play in my first Buffy: The Vampire Slayer card game tournament. He knew the game better and beat me handily, but it was the beginning of a friendship that lasted until the end of his life. For years, we got together on weekends to play Buffy. We traveled together to Iowa to the Weekend O' Buffy to play all weekend long, surrounded by friends. Over the years, we also played in roleplaying campaigns together, meeting and playing at my house. For the last 5 years or so, we also gamed together every Saturday night at the Family Game Store, playing all kinds of board games. I remember back when we were still just playing Buffy at the store in Dundalk, Sean was studying the adventure game, A Touch of Evil. I told him, "If you buy that game, I will play it with you!" He did, and we did - but it was a hard game to win!

Sean was a great friend. It was a joy to game with him because he was always so enthusiastic about the game. He was also always very welcoming to new players, explaining rules and offering such good strategy suggestions that the new person stood a good chance of winning.

Though our friendship centered on gaming, we also got to know each other's lives. He watched my children grow, and I heard about the scary times when everyone around him was getting laid off at the Post. My oldest daughter was born just a week or two after one of his nephews. I remember that not long after, he had to miss a session because he'd dropped everything to go on a business trip with his sister and provide child care for her. I was really impressed because I couldn't see one of my brothers doing that for me.

I really thought that we'd still be planning gaming sessions together when we were old and retired, and our biggest concerns were fitting our game collections into our houses.

I'm thankful for the time we had together, but sad that it had to end too soon this way.
