



## Thomas Weber

February 23, 1927 - December 29, 2011

Thomas Calvin Weber, age 84, of Manassas died Thursday, December 29, 2011 at Prince William Hospital in Manassas. He was born February 23, 1927 to the late Max J. and Pearl J. Russell Weber.

Calvin spent some of his early years, along with his sister Virginia, on his Aunt Mary's farm in Wellington. He served two duties of service in the U. S. Army. First in Europe in the final months of World War II, and was awarded the World War II Victory Ribbon and Army Occupation Medal. The second was 1949 to 1953 when he was stationed in the Panama Canal Zone and Kodiak, Alaska; he served almost 8 years in the Army. Following his military service, Calvin worked at the Library of Congress in Washington, D.C. and numerous construction projects in several states as a heavy equipment operator.

He is survived by five brothers: Earl and his wife Janet, Harold and his wife Carolyn, Walter and his wife Janet, Max and his wife Barbara, Harry and his wife Linda and two sisters, Maxine Parcell and husband Frank and Virginia Kraner. He is also survived by three generations of nieces, nephews and cousins and Kathie Oldaker, who was a very close friend of his. In addition to his parents, he was preceded in death by two brothers, Walton and Frederick, three sisters, Mildred O'Dell, Mary Yeida and Gloria Houk.

A graveside service conducted by the Reverend Aubrey Sanders will be held

at 10:00 a.m. at the Woodbine Church Cemetery on Tuesday, January 3rd. In lieu of flowers, memorial contributions may be made to a charity of the donor's choice. Arrangements are being handled by the Pierce Funeral Home, Manassas, Virginia.
